Our mission

Our students are secure in themselves. They are proud of their own identity, but they also respect the identity of others, regardless of gender, ethnicity or religion. They have the ability and skills to effectively communicate with and seek to understand people from other cultures. They collaborate and cooperate. They demonstrate kindness, care, and concern for other people, their community and their environment.

I Explore / Ka Whakatewhatewha Au

Our students are curious learners. They use a range of thinking strategies to solve problems. They are encouraged to be innovative and creative. They can be adventurous and take risks with their learning. They understand that learning happens everywhere.

I Question / Ka Urupounamu Au

Our students think for themselves. They ask 'What if?' They ask informed questions and actively seek the thoughts of others. They endeavour to understand why they are thinking a particular thought. They build trust in order to ask good questions and debate with each other. They have the confidence to share their opinions whilst actively listening to differing opinions.

I Strive / Ka Whakarīrā Au

Our students do their best. They have a 'can do' attitude. They aim high and work diligently to achieve personal excellence. They have a positive outlook to learning and show grit to overcome challenges. They have a growth mindset and confidently take risks. They reflect on their own learning and seek feedback in order to improve.

I Give Back / Ka Takoha Au

Our students contribute. They make a positive difference to their various communities, no matter their age. They share their skills, leadership and experience. They willingly help others.

Our values

Values can be described as "beliefs about what is important or desirable." They are expressed in the ways people speak and act.

The Ilam School values encourage our children to reflect on their behaviour and how they interact with others. They are woven throughout the daily curriculum and are discussed both inside and outside the classroom.

Our history

Ilam School is located in the suburb of Ilam, directly beside the University of Canterbury, bordered by the Haere-roa branch of the Otakaro River.

Across from the school is Ilam Homestead, which dates back to when Christchurch was first settled by Europeans. It was first built by Englishman John Watts-Russell, who arrived in Canterbury in 1850, and named after his birthplace, Ilam Hall in Staffordshire, England. The house changed ownership several times before burning down in 1910.

Edgar Stead (1881-1949) rebuilt the homestead in the 1920s, and cultivated a rhododendron and azalea collection which is internationally known today.

Ilam School was opened in 1950, so we look forward to celebrating our 75th Jubilee in 2025.

Our logo

The bright yellow flower of the Ilam School logo is a stylised azalea. We love having a flower as our logo because it represents cultivation and growth. Each of our learners has the chance to cultivate their knowledge and interests, and our teachers — just like a gardener — plant ideas and nurture growth so that each child can bloom.

Interestingly...

- The azalea is not native to New Zealand: it originates from Asia.
- It can represent a deep inner desire to lead.
- It's a flower that is highly sought after.
- The azalea can endure harsh conditions.

At the centre, or heart, of our flower logo is a white star, a light that we believe shines out of every person at Ilam School. Make sure you look for our many azalea plants — how many colours can you find? — planted around the school.

Enrolment

Starting school is an exciting time for children and their families. We strive to make the transition to Ilam School as smooth and enjoyable as possible.

We have strong relationships with local preschools and plenty of experience helping families from other parts of the country and overseas settle into our neighbourhood. We'd love your child to be part of our kura (school).

Our school has a geographic enrolment zone. If you live within this zone your children are entitled to attend llam School, assuming you meet the other requirements to attend a New Zealand state school.

Ilam School operates cohort (group) entry for new entrants (5-year-olds). Rather than starting on their fifth birthday, children start school in small groups at the next available intake — usually two times each term.

We cannot accept responsibility for any child at school before 8.30am.

Because our teachers need time before the day starts to prepare for class, students are not to enter their classroom before the 8.30am bell sounds. Students arriving at school before this time may wait quietly in the Senior School area.

At the end of the school day all children not taking part in a supervised programme or sports practice are expected to be clear of the school grounds by 3.15pm. Any children not collected by 3.15pm should report to the office.

The school office is open from 8.30am to 4.00pm.

In the Classroom

Teaching and learning in today's New Zealand classroom may look very different from when you were at school, or from the education system in the country you come from. However, our core business remains teaching the relevant skills in English and Mathematics to our learners.

Cooperative learning and group work are an important part of our everyday learning. What might look like play or having fun is actually an essential part of classroom life in New Zealand.

We get to know our learners as individuals. Why? Because only by knowing our learners can we offer a curriculum that is centred around their needs and interests.

Providing a learner-centred school increases engagement and motivation — our students explore and question the world around them. They are interested in what they are learning.

We deliberately teach our learners how to develop strategies and skills to enhance their thinking and their capacity to learn.

We make sure that students are exposed to a rich and varied range of learning experiences during their time at our school.

At Ilam School, we take pride in our knowledge and application of the national curriculum and education pedagogy (the method and practice of teaching) — our staff is experienced, up-to-date and supported.

We enjoy a close relationship with our neighbour, the University of Canterbury. Staff and students of both organisations contribute to each other's programmes. We sometimes even get to use the university facilities, which is an exciting opportunity for our students.

The Government's 'one hour a day' policy for teaching reading, writing, and maths started Term 1 2024. Even though Ilam School already does this daily and there is no real change, we will continue to spend an average of at least an hour a day reading, writing, and maths. Our students will continue to receive regular, purposeful instruction in these core areas to help them make progress with their learning. There is more information available on the Ministry's website.

Cellphones

We recommend that cell phones are kept at home. If your child requires a cell phone for information regarding pick up/drop off then we ask that the cell phone is handed into the school office first thing in the morning. The cell phone will be kept in a secure location and it can be collected at the end of the day. If cell phones are used during the school day we will ask your child to take it to the office to be kept in a secure location. We ask that you support us with these expectations.

Should your child require a cell phone for health/learning purposes we ask that you discuss this with Kirsten Aaron our Deputy Principal.

Please note: If cell phones are brought to school, the school is not responsible for any loss or damage.

Language Support

We welcome all international families and provide an inclusive and supportive space for all students. If your child has a first language other than English, they may need some support with their oral language and literacy skills.

Language Support Team

We are proud of our well-regarded and well-staffed Language Support team — they are skilled at helping your child accelerate their English language progress.

When you enrol in our school you will be introduced to the Language Support leader, who will arrange a time to meet with you and to test your child's English. This helps us determine the level of support your child may need.

If necessary, your child will be placed in a Language Support group. This will be a 30-minute intensive English lesson, four times a week.

Pastoral Care

Our Language Support team also provides pastoral care for families. We will support you with your questions or any issues you may be facing.

Translators

Ilam School has translators on site for Mandarin, Korean, Japanese, Spanish or Samoan speakers. Please let us know if you require this assistance.

Ouestions?

Our Deputy Principal, Kirsten Aaron, is happy to speak with you if your child has English as an additional language, or if you have questions about enrolling your child at Ilam School.

Learning Support

If your child has an additional learning need, they may be able to access support. We have a number of highly skilled Learning Assistants who work closely with teachers to determine the best outcomes for these students.

Uniform

llam School is proud of our school uniform.

Not only does a uniform enhance the school identity and feeling of 'we are one team', it provides good quality, economical clothing. It also eliminates the problems associated with 'clothing competitiveness' some other non-uniform schools can face.

All your child's clothing should be clearly named. Lost property is stored at the school for a short period and unclaimed items are then disposed of.

Our wonderful PTA (Parent Teacher Association) organises Second-Hand Clothing Sales on a number of occasions throughout the year. Dates are communicated through the school newsletter and whanau calendar.

Library

Why do we love our school library? Let us count the ways...

Reason #1

Because it is a welcoming space. With shelves jam-packed with fiction and non-fiction, there is a book for everyone.

Reason #2

Because a substantial body of research tells us that quality school library and information services have a positive impact on student achievement — and we love everything to do with student support and achievement.

Reason #3

Because a school library supports specific aspects of a child's learning, especially information literacy and a love of reading.

It can also be considered as a service, an access point, a collection of resources, or a physical place — how versatile is that?

Kapa Haka

Kapa haka is the term for Māori performing arts — kapa = to form a line haka = to dance.

Kapa haka involves an emotional and powerful combination of song, dance and chanting. It is performed by cultural groups on marae, at schools, and during special events and festivals.

During a kapa haka performance, you could experience a range of compositions, from chants and choral singing to graceful action songs and ferocious war dances. Some performances even include skilled demonstrations of traditional weaponry.

We are fortunate at Ilam School to have a skilled kapa haka tutor who works throughout the year with the student group, which performs at assemblies and special occasions.

Music

All Ilam School students have the opportunity to be involved in excellent choirs at their team level (Junior/Middle/Senior).

Children in the Senior Choir also have the opportunity to perform with a large number of other Christchurch school children at the North West Music Festival and the Christchurch Schools' Music Festival.

Participation in the school orchestra is offered to children who play an instrument — all children who have a basic ability in reading music can enter into the orchestra. Their skills always improve rapidly!

We are fortunate to have skilled music tutors who offer individual tuition on a variety of musical instruments. Bookings are essential and can be made at the school office.

Sport

llam School students enjoy plenty of opportunities to take part in individual and team sports, such as:

- Table tennis

Parents keen to help coach or organise teams are always welcome to volunteer.

School Houses

All children (and staff!) at Ilam School are members of a school 'House'. Just like at Hogwarts, all children from the same family are in the same House.

The Houses provide a chance for some healthy competition within the school. Each term, there are events for students and staff to take part in and earn points for their House. Children and adults alike enjoy dressing up in their House colours and cheering on their House-mates.

There are five Houses, all named after South Island rivers:

Hurunui (blue) Conway (green) Rakaia (orange) Waimakariri (yellow)

Waitaki (red)

The House Cup, presented at the final assembly of the year, is keenly contested. Who will be the winner this year?

Ilam OSCAR

Will you need help with childcare either before or after school, or during the school holidays? Ilam OSCAR (Out Of School Care and Recreation) may be able to help — Ilam School hosts this on-site programme to assist families with childcare.

Ilam OSCAR provides a quality out-of-school care programme that is safe, organised and fun. It caters for children of different ages, gender and cultural backgrounds and aims to meet individual needs and interests.

Staff are carefully selected to meet the high standards of programme delivery set by the programme director.

The fact that the programme is often fully booked speaks to how much our students enjoy their time at OSCAR.

Redevelopment of facilities

Ilam School is part of the Ministry of Education (MoE) Canterbury Schools Rebuild Programme, with our school preparing to undertake a major redevelopment project.

This multi-million dollar project will modernise our current school facilities and provide facilities that support our tamariki — with spaces that support their learning, as well as functional spaces for our wider school whānau and staff.

We completed the first Master Planning stage of the development in 2022.

In 2023 we moved into the Design stage. Construction began in 2024.

A Redevelopment Sub-Committee will oversee the project as it moves forward, with members representing our Board, our staff and our wider community.



Our People

Student Leaders

We strive to provide an array of opportunities for our learners to try out their leadership skills.

Cultural Leaders

- Each year, a number of Year 6 students from various cultures are chosen to represent the school as Cultural Leaders.
- They help with cultural activities around the school.. They assist with welcoming our international visitors, and help children from overseas feel welcome in our school.
- Our Cultural Leaders lead our Mihi Whakatau, share information about their country to the school assemblies, and information about their culture to the school staff.

School Council

- Up to 10 students (from Years 5 and 6) are nominated each year to form the Ilam School Council.
- The School Council is responsible for helping with school initiatives, events, fundraising for charities, and bringing forth issues and ideas.
- The Council meets regularly throughout the year.

House Captains

• Each School House team has a House Captain — a group of senior students who help organise the House events and organise games during lunchtimes for children to play.

Head Librarians

- Up to 10 senior students assist the School Librarian to deliver access to the library during break times
- The Head Librarians help students with their book needs, maintain the atmosphere in the library and ensure that the student voice is heard.
- They also meet with the wider student leadership group to organise school wide literature related activities.

School Board

All state and state-integrated schools in New Zealand (like Ilam School) have a school board, which has overall responsibility and accountability for the school/kura. The school board's legal responsibilities are determined by the Education and Training Act 2020.

School boards have a stewardship role that involves planning for, and acting in, the interests of the school and its community. Student learning, wellbeing, achievement and progress are the board's main concerns.

The board is guardian of the school's values. It is responsible for setting the strategic direction of the school and overseeing the management of personnel, property, finance and administration. It's important to note that the board is NOT responsible for the day-to-day running of the school — that's the job of the principal.

Parents are elected as Board Members by the parent community. A staff member is elected onto the Board by the school staff. The principal is automatically a member of the Board. In certain situations, additional members can be asked to join the board (co-opted) for a set period.

School board elections are held every three years. The current presiding member (the chairperson) can be contacted via email on ilamboardchair@ilam.school.nz

Parent Teacher Association (PTA)
